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Foreword By the Executive Manager

would like to draw your kind attention and convey to you the real picture of the situation in Taiz governorate. As a result of intense fighting between the conflict parties Taiz face an severe and complex humanitarian situation and increased sharply across all sectors, which has exacerbated pre-existing vulnerabilities, degraded community resilience and accelerated the collapse of public institutions that lead to emergency and urgent humanitarian response.

Taiz divided into 23 districts and the Population of Taiz governorate is 3.1 Million of people, unfortunately more than 13 districts are suffering from the ongoing catastrophic war which cause devastated humanitarian needs and affected over 1.8 Million of people who lives in that districts and forced most of them to leave their homes to anther safer areas. day after day as a result of spread the destroyed war in most areas of Taiz the influx of IDPs are increased dramatically and the majority of them are unable to access to the life-saving basic services. The conflict has caused critical humanitarian crisis in areas of conflict districts and in districts where the IDPs has settled.

Despite these, multiple crises, including armed conflict, displacement, risk of famine and disease outbreaks that have created the worst man-made humanitarian crisis, continue to outpace ongoing response efforts, and additional resources are required to scale up interventions to more response to the IDPs and affected communities and provide the life-saving services. IYCY is intending to scale up the ongoing integrated cholera response in Taiz, governorate with focus to the most affected people of IDPs and host communities in the 6 target districts.

IYCY has recently responded to significant increase in the number of IDPs in conflict areas in Taizz governorate with integrated package of WASH, Shelter, Health and Food Security services in the 6 districts in Taizz. IYCY is doubled its efforts to response to those affected people by the ongoing conflict however due to budget limits IYCY faced challenges to cover the gaps and provide the basic life-saving services to the IDPs and affected communities in the 6 districts.

Under Health and WASH clusters and With supporting by UN-OCHA IYCY has been responding to the ongoing outbreak with Health and Wash integrated cholera response in Taizz governorate since mild of February, 2017 until now. IYCY is doubled its efforts to response to those IDPs and affected communities by the ongoing conflict and we are kindly requested from all humanitarian responders to response urgently to people still inside the conflict areas and to IDPs and affected communities which they are unable to access and lack to the life-saving basic services of shelter, Food Security, Health, Wash and protection in Taiz governorate.

Executive Summary

ver the last year, the crisis in Taizz has gradually evolved into a complex situation humanitarian characterised by increased internal displacements, destruction infrastructure, economic decline, and unable to access to the life-saving basic services. The scarcity of livelihoods, income, and access to basic services in their home towns and villages, coupled with lack of security, has resulted in significant increase in internal displacements and IDPs. Thus, there is a paramount need to strengthen the resilience of affected populations.

According to TFPM 16th Report - October 2017 approximately 1.5 million (or 74%) IDPs originate from four governorates of origin: in Taizz (550,416 IDPs or 27.3%). Most Taizz IDPs in urban and rural areas live in poor host communities that are themselves in need of support. This leaves most of the families poor and dependent on assistance due to increase the influx of IDPs and lack of security.

Based on the Needs Assessments IYCY has identified more than 2,532 HHs of IDPs Families (17,724 IDPs individuals) in the 6 target districts in Taizz governorate that are recently displaced from the conflict areas. IYCY propose to meet the most emergency needs to vulnerable people men, women, girls and boys of IDPs Families that are currently displaced and host communities which are also affected by the internal conflicts in the 6 target districts (Al - Mukha, Maqbanah, Shara'b Ar Rawnah, Jabal Habashy, Al Mawasit and Al Wazi'iyah districts in Taizz governorate). The intervention is building on the ongoing

conflict in the target districts in Taizz. The integrated project will contribute with life-saving assistant targeting the most vulnerable IDPs and host communities in 6 districts by Shelter, WASH, and Food Security services in Taizz Governorate. Through these matrix of projects, IYCY aims to fill the gaps in the Food security, Shelter, Wash, health, protection, and education sectors.

The goal to avert a humanitarian crisis and long-term dependency situation by both helping IDPs and the local population, through improving the shelter, water and sanitation, short-term food supply, and living conditions for both the IDPs and those families host them by providing emergency assistance in the form of limited shelter materials, latrines, blankets, wheat, beans, cooking oil, and increase hygiene awareness in the 6 target districts in Taizz.

Since November, 2017 IYCY has responded to significant increase in the number of IDPs in conflict areas in Taizz governorate with integrated package of WASH, Shelter, and Food Security services in the 6 districts in Taizz. IYCY is doubled its efforts to response to those affected people by the ongoing conflict however due to budget limits IYCY faced challenges to cover the gaps and provide the basic life-saving services to the IDPs in the 6 districts.

As a result of the above, this appeal through its matrix of projects seeks to scale up the activities and the outreach of the project to the most vulnerable IDPs and host communities and To improve the access of IDPs and conflict affected communities to life saving services of Shelter, WASH, and Food Security , health , Protection ,and Education services in Al - Mukha, Maqbanah, Shara'b Ar Rawnah, Al Mawasit, Jabal Habashy and Al Wazi'iyah districts in Taizz governorate .

Context And Needs Analysis

Yemen has historically been the Arab region's poorest country with almost half its population living below the poverty line. It has also historically had the highest rates of chronic malnutrition regionally. It is highly dependent on food imports making it hugely vulnerable to volatility in international food prices.

The situation is further aggravated by high prevalence of severe food insecurity and malnutrition. The health condition of this vulnerable population is already compromised by the deteriorating situation, increasing their susceptibility to cholera infection and associated complications contributing to higher case fatality rate. Two years of conflict, compounded by an economic decline have devastated livelihoods, depleted safety nets, weakened social service delivery, and ability to access social services.

YHRP, 2018 has reported that over than 22.2 million people in need of humanitarian and protection assistance.11.3 million People in acute need more than 16.4 million people lack access to basic healthcare, 17.8 million people are food insecure in Yemen, including 7.3 million people who are severely food insecure, 3.3 million children and pregnant or lactating women are acutely malnourished, including 462,000 children under 5 suffering from severe acute malnutrition, 16 million people require assistance to ensure access to safe drinking water and sanitation, including 11.6 million who are in acute need, 5.4 million people need emergency shelter or essential household items, including IDPs, host communities and initial returnees, 11.3 million people need assistance to protect their safety, dignity or basic rights, including 2.9 million people living in acutely affected areas, 2 million school-age children are out of school and need support to fulfil their right to education, 8 million Yemenis

Under Health and WASH clusters and With supporting by UN-OCHA IYCY has been responding to the ongoing outbreak with Health and Wash integrated cholera response in Taizz governorate since mild of February, 2017 until now. Six districts has been targeting in Taizz governorate Sharab Ar Rawanh, Magbanah, Al Wazya'ah, Jabal Habashy, Al Muka and At Ta'iziyah districts. IYCY has been established 9 HFs and 45 ORPs in the 6 target districts of Taizz governorate to implement Health activities. As of 20 Aug, 2017. IYCY has supported the target health facilities with supplementary supplies and drugs to support the treatment of AWD and cholera cases, building the capacity of the health workers through training for 90 health workers from HFs and ORPs on cholera treatment guidelines and effective case management and provided the more than 90 health workers incentives in the 6 target districts. Additionally, 20 Oral Rehydration Points (ORPs) were opened in 6 targeted districts to treat moderate and mild cases, with a referral system of severe cases to the CTCs. Over 17,417 people benefitted from chlorinated water supplies (at system and household levels), more than 65,143 people benefitted from water storage disinfection (both at community and household levels and IDPs). Almost 123,691 people were reached with key cholera messages, through household, community and mass media campaigns. Water, sanitation and hygiene related activities took place in 833 villages in 6 districts. Now IYCY has face the challenges of increase the influx of the IDPs from the conflict areas to the districts where IYCY has been operating its project.

Despite these, increase the influx of the IDPs from the conflict areas continue to outpace ongoing response efforts, and additional resources are required to scale up interventions to more response to the IDPs and provide the life-saving services. IYCY is intending to scale up the ongoing integrated cholera response in Taiz, governorate with focus to the most affected people of IDPs and host communities in the 6 target districts.

STRATEGIC OBJECTIVES OF IYCY

In 2018, IYCY have consolidated their strategic focus to prioritize direct, life-saving assistance and protection. All activities will promote equitable access for men, women, boys and girls. Partners will also seek to ensure that humanitarian action promotes sustainable recovery.

In light of substantial increases in survival needs and violations of basic rights, the IYCY are consolidating its 2018 strategic focus to emphasize direct, life-saving assistance and protection.

- 1. Provide life-saving assistance to people in need, prioritizing the most vulnerable.
- 2. Promote and advocate protection, access and accountability to and for affected people.
- 3.. Ensure that all response activities promote equitable access to assistance for women, girls, boys and men.

IYCY's strategic plan remains focused on delivering lifesaving services and supplies in line with YHRP-2018. This includes providing an integrated package of health, nutrition, WASH, food and protection. IYCY and partners are scaling up efforts to reach the most vulnerable people especially internally displaced persons which have now reached 2 million (IDPs). In light of the huge impact of poverty on people, targeted health, nutrition, WASH, food and protection appeal reach the most vulnerable families in Taiz. IYCY and partners continues to generate new evidence on geographic vulnerabilities, effectiveness of early relief efforts and remaining gaps in lifesaving interventions.

IYCY and partners continues to work closely with local government providers to improve their capacity to respond to the ongoing crisis. IYCY's strategy prioritizes actions in such a way that supplies and services are directed to areas with high levels of population displacement.

RESPONSE STRATEGY

In 2018, IYCY aim to reach 52,434 people in Taiz with a range of life-saving and protection services. IYCY will target the most affected people who require urgent assistance.

IYCY SCOPE AND PRIORITIES

IYCY focus to emphasize life-saving humanitarian and protection assistance. Within the overall strategy, partners also agreed three additional steps to ensure that the IYCY strategic plan is as tightly prioritized as possible given the overwhelming level of need:

- 1) Prioritize locations facing the most severe needs as identified in the 2018.
- 2) Ensure all activities and targets are within current implementation capacity
- 3) Include only the most critical humanitarian activities to save lives, protect civilians and support recovery.

OPERATIONAL CAPACITY

IYCY has been working in Taizz since 2014 and has a sub-office in Taiz governorate. IYCY has implemented several projects across different sectors, including, but not limited to, Health, Nutrition, WASH, Food Security, Shelter, Education, and Protection, working in close coordination with UN agencies and with Governments, local authorities and international and local NGOs.

IYCY reached more than 74,967 people gained access to safe drinking water, 421,345 people benefitted from water treatment, and participated in awareness and behavior change activities. IYCY support for health facilities, which included the provision of supplies and operational support, enabled 23 health facilities to stay open in 2016-2017. In addition, some 22,865 children with SAM received treatment and more than 12,468 pregnant and lactating women accessed health care, the needs continued to outstrip the response. IYCY has a very good access to the most critical areas in Taizz as it adopted neutrality as a core value to serve most affected people. IYCY has an office in Taizz and has the full capacity to implement any project in Yemen. IYCY access and trust was gained during its projects implemented in very critical times where no other organizations where able to reach people or take the risks to provide the most needs lifesaving services to the most vulnerable people.

Since November, 2017 IYCY has responded to significant increase in the number of IDPs in conflict areas in Taizz governorate with integrated package of WASH, Shelter, and Food Security services in the 6 districts in Taizz. IYCY is doubled its efforts to response to those affected people by the ongoing conflict however due to budget limits IYCY faced challenges to cover the gaps and provide the basic life-saving services to the IDPs in the 6 districts. Building on that, IYCY introduced this Emergency Appeal to cover areas where IYCY has capacity to intervene.




Objectives

- 1. Provide adequate shelter solutions and non-food items to the most vulnerable
- 2. Ensure access to basic services for the most vulnerable living in collective centres and settlements
- 3. Strengthen local stakeholders' capacity for Shelter, NFI & CCCM response

The project is in line with the shelter cluster's objectives, it is critical to improve the service provision through enhanced coordination, better needs assessments and the use of common tools/designs. The need for basic shelter is all the more critical in the case of the most vulnerable groups, including girls and boys, senior citizens, disabled people, and chronically ill patients. On the other hand, pregnant women and single mothers require special attention. These population groups should be provided with basic liveability conditions, including drinking water supply and safe cooking to avoid other risks that may render them all the more vulnerable. This sector is being prioritized due to the high number of IDPs families without liveable housing.

The project will provide integrated NFI/shelter to targeted IDP populations in urgent need. The project will demonstrate an integrated approach and follow the minimum standards of the Shelter Cluster. Activities will include mapping of IDP settlements, maintaining up-to-date settlement information, assessing the needs, targeting the most vulnerable, transport and distribution of the NFIs.

Implementation Methodology

IYCY team has carefully identified families who needs assistance through validating their information through home visited and cross checking with other NGOs. In order to ease tensions between IDPs and hosting communities, 25% of the project's beneficiaries will be vulnerable hosting communities.

The project is designed to be implemented on two phases for 4 months target HHs of IDPs and local Communities in 6 districts of AI - Mukha, Maqbanah, Shara'b Ar Rawnah, Jabal Habashy, AI Mawasit and AI Wazi'iyah districts in Taizz governorate, with each phase lasting for 2 months. In the first 2 months and due to budget limitation which is not enough to cover all the gaps, IYCY will target the most vulnerable IDPs who already identified by IYCY Team in 6 districts as rapid response with urgent life-saving services of Food security and Wash services in order to meet the most emergency needs of the IDPs . The second phase will be underfunded emergency requests, consequently IYCY will continue financially struggle to cover the Remain budget of the project and working with the same families and the other of IDPs beneficiaries who still meet the vulnerability criteria

Justify Chosen Gender Marker Code

IYCY has consistent and strong capacities in gender mainstreaming, and a strong focus on protection for vulnerable women, girls, boys and men. Gender has been a main consideration in the design and delivery of the project. IYCY has managed to reach the target communities women through the hiring of local women from target areas together with an experienced female coordinator engaged to directly talk to women and record their concerns.

IYCY makes a deliberate effort to identify the specific Food Security, WASH and HEALTH needs of women and girls while including equal number of women enumerators in needs assessment teams and ensuring the collection of data from 50 % of women in all the target areas.

IYCY gathered disaggregated data that included safety and security concerns of women and girls The disaggregated data from the needs assessment were also split into age and gender categories. Special attention is paid to the needs of vulnerable groups of women and girls, such as female headed households, pregnant and lactating women, women with disabilities, elderly women, adolescent girls and children. IYCY has carried out consulting meetings with women and girls on Food, water and sanitation and health needs to ensure that program strategies mitigate the exposure to risk. During the implementation, IYCY will maintain a protective environment at the community level, so that girls and women in particular are not exposed to harm or gender based violence while undertaking their daily Food, WASH and HEALTH activities. Further, gender equity will be observed while implementing those activities that are not specifically targeted at women and girls. Women, men, boys and girls are treated equally, with their differing needs being targeted and supported accordingly. Participation of all age and gender groups will be emphasized so that all beneficiaries can voice their concerns and express their preferences during implementation.

Protection Mainstreaming

The project has prioritized the safety and dignity of beneficiaries by the following:

- 1) Ensure that the location where Shelter services and water providing and hygiene kits and Food baskets distributions are providing services and routes to them are away from actual or potential threats such as violence; especially the risk or threat of gender based violence (GBV), and attacks from armed groups.
- 2) Ensure provision of services in appropriate times, when women are able to come to the place of service provision.
- 3) The project will ensure provision of services in suitable places that could ensure privacy confidentiality of beneficiaries in any form of consultation, counseling or personal information sharing. While staff will be given orientation on how to ensure beneficiaries privacy and confidentiality are respected.
- 4) Using direct observation and discussion groups with persons with disabilities in the community to identify the type of adaptations that are needed.
- 5) Considering separate waiting areas (male/female).
- 6) Will ensure that an information sharing protocol is established so that a survivor of abuse will not need to repeat their story, potentially exposing them to further trauma; and all efforts are made to ensure their confidentiality
- 7) Will not collect information which is not needed to contribute towards promoting the well-being of the individual.
- 8) In the displacement communities, IYCY will consult IDPs as well as host communities about Food, health and WASH needs so as to avoid community tensions. In addition, the project team will make sure that there is no tension or inequality that could lead to violence and harassment of one group or another
- 9) Establish a formal complaint mechanism which ensures IDPs and host communities are able to raise their complaints and that the appropriate feed-back is communicated on time.

WHAT IF...WE FAIL TO RESPOND?



Millions of Severely Food Insecure People will Risk Starvation

Conflict has severely exacerbated chronic food insecurity in Yemen. Today, an estimated 17.8 million people are unable to meet their food needs independently. Without rapid humanitarian assistance severely food insecure people will face an immediate risk of starvation. Food security across the country will continue to deteriorate due to sporadic availability of food, lack of income and disrupted markets.



People will have no Access to Drinking Water

Conflict has cut off 16 million people's access to clean water, severely exacerbating pre-crisis water scarcity and leaving a total of 20.3 million without adequate water and sanitation. In 2018, IYCY aim to enable access to clean water for the most vulnerable with emergency water, sanitation and hygiene support.



Affected People will not have Access to Basic Health Care

The majority of health facilities closed since the crisis began and critical medicines in short supply, Yemen's health system is collapsing. Without immediate support, millions of people will have inadequate access to basic health care, increasing suffering and putting their lives at risk.



Malnourished Children will Face Greater Risk of Death

IYCY aim to treat severely acutely malnourished children and moderately acutely malnourished children. Without immediate treatment, severely acutely malnourished children are die than their healthy peers. Moderately acutely malnourished children are three times likelier to die. In non-fatal cases, malnutrition threatens to permanently stunt affected children's cognitive and physical development, robbing them of their full potential.



Millions of People will Face grave threats to their Basic rights without Support

Rights violations are rampant in Yemen every day. Reports of child recruitment have and reports of gender-based violence have increased. More than 2.1 million people have been forced from their homes in Yemen. Urgent support is needed to monitor and advocate protection and provide assistance to survivors of rights violations.
